Student 1: Professor Akresh (Rich) was an amazing and knowledgeable instructor as to not only course matter, but human matters as well. I have never met someone with such balance of compassion, wisdom, academic and street-smart prowess. Dealing with such a large class in such a unique environment as Burkina Faso is difficult beyond understanding on so many levels, but Richard proved adept and kept us all safe, well-fed, and constantly learning. The course itself was amazing. I cannot in words describe how much I learned and experienced on an emotional and physical level. Richard was great in facilitating discussion of events and talks and helping us digest/understand it after. One thing about a course to Burkina Faso or any place in Africa is that you can easily take it to be a 2 week fest of uncomfortable, sub-par conditions if one does not confront how we live/think in America and how excessively wasteful or misguided we may be. Richard encouraged dialogue, listened to our thoughts, complaints, and conflicted emotions and put up with our ungratefulness. The strength of the program is the rareness of the experience. Though we may not have enjoyed 5-star hotels or enjoyed the luxury of buffets or exotic foods, Richard's relationships and connections in Burkina Faso and the consequent curriculum was uniquely one of a kind, hard to replicate like any old trip to London or Paris. I am wholly grateful for this experience-- it was amazing!

Student 2: This course was the most interesting and influential course that I have taken through the University of Illinois. Professor Richard Akresh, with the help of Emily Bagby, made the trip to Burkina Faso an immeasurably valuable experience leaving me with new perspectives and directions of my academic and professional future. The amount of effort that Professor Akresh went through to set up this trip before departure and throughout the two weeks in Burkina, in combination with the contacts he has in Burkina which made our appointments possible provided for a unique and profound learning experience that I can not imagine anyone else being able to organize. From the village home stay in Bereba, to the interactive meetings with the Peace Corps, CRS, Plan International and the US Ambassador, to falling asleep under the open sky in the desert, this course exceeded my high expectations and left me with memories to cherish, friendships to develop, and experiences to help guide my future. I can

only hope that Professor Akresh might lead this trip again so that the next group of excited young students can be blown away by the trip of a lifetime.

Student 9: This course was an action packed two weeks. Furthermore, it did help to have Antonio and Ferdinand for translation and general logistics - it seemed be one more way to help things run smoothly. - Living accommodations were fine - they did require adjustment, but by the end of the day, a cool bucket shower was almost welcome. Furthermore, it is only two weeks, and how often are we in

Burkina? - The field trips/excursions were brilliant. The breadth of exposure and the amount of questions we could ask was great.
